Uniting in Vision Recap

We had a terrific afternoon on Sunday, March 13th as many members of UPC gathered to unite in Vision together. We began by naming all the changes that have taken place in the life of the church over the past five to seven years. We generated a big list with everything from worship and programmatic changes, to changes in staff and membership.

We then identified some positive changes and some of the changes that were more challenging. The group felt the most positive changes for the church were the new preschool, one blended-style worship service, staffing changes, and the increased younger families at church. The group also named the more challenging changes, which included changes in church demographics, budget constraints, and the transition to adding more contemporary elements to worship. The move to one service that has traditional and contemporary elements is overall seen as a big positive, but it has, nonetheless, been a challenging change for many people.

We then discussed things that would make the church a very different place if they went away or no longer existed. Members named the Sunday morning cookies, individual staff members, Small Groups, our open and welcoming community, children in worship, Connecting Point, Preschool, Educational classes, and our building and grounds.

We also named the unique gifts and assets that UPC has for doing ministry like a Parish Nurse, our large building and expansive grounds, our larger staff, our culture of welcoming, and openness to diversity, questions, and change.

Lastly, we named some of our dreams for UPC. Some of the dreams are that we pay off our church mortgage, expand the preschool to other grade levels, start live-streaming services, expand the Snack Pack Program, grow the choir, and develop the property and grounds more so that it is used by the community more often. Another big dream was that our church become more racially diverse.

We have some big dreams for UPC which is great. I hope we can continue these great conversations. One way you can participate in the conversation is by filling out three postcards that can be found at the Welcome Center and then returning them to the church. The three postcards give you the chance to fill in the blank for "What I love about UPC is...." "UPC Has Made A Difference In My Life Because..." and "My Hopes and Dreams For UPC Are..."

We'll display all your answers so we can all learn and see the ways UPC is loved, the difference UPC makes in our lives, and the hopes and dreams we have for our faith community together.

Thank you for being a part of this community that grows and nurtures followers of Christ in a welcoming community.

Results of the Uniting in Vision Survey

The first part of the survey that was given out in last month's Chimes focused on how you, the congregation, perceived the identity of United Presbyterian Church.

Based on the surveys, the congregation believes the church is more influenced by contemporary ideas and trends than by history and tradition. There is also a clear sense that there is a place and role for the history and tradition of the church, but the church isn't held hostage to the past.

There is more of a split about whether our church is focused on serving our members or serving the world. A church needs to serve its members, but be a place that can and does serve the world. One of the best ways a church serves its members is by equipping them to serve others. The Bible describes the church as the body of Christ sent to be a giving and serving community for the sake of the world, not for itself. With that said, the church has to strengthen, support, and empower its members to be the Body of Christ in the world.

There is also a healthy mix of opinions about whether the church's approach to social issues is basically education, leaving any action to individual conscience, or if the church as a whole should act together to take a stand on social issues as a congregation. The majority of respondents, however, believe that the church needs to occasionally take a stand together on issues and work and act for justice. This has to be done in such a way as to allow for differences of opinions and different ways of working for justice. The church needs to provide education and allow individuals to make up their own mind, too.

The congregation strongly believes the our church feels like one big family, is very involved with the community, and that the UPC's approach to individual salvation emphasizes education, nurture, and gradual growth rather than stressing a moment of conversion and born-again experience. It is also clear the congregation does not believe we have too strong a focus on our denominational identity and heritage. The general consensus is that we do not make our denominational affiliation a focus of who we are, but we also do not ignore it completely.

The second part of the survey focused on worship and programmatic preferences.

The majority of respondents believe the congregation prefers traditional hymns in worship, yet the majority of respondents personally prefer a mix of musical styles. That means there's a sense that there is a strong preference that does not actually exist. There are some who prefer traditional hymns, and some who prefer more modern hymns or other forms of contemporary worship, but overall the congregation seems to enjoy, and prefer, a healthy mix.

The survey also suggests the congregation likes traditional sermons that have a scripture and then an explanation, but also likes when sermons sometimes utilize multimedia, music, drama, or more conversational elements. A strong majority of respondents also prefer there to be some congregational leadership of worship so the pastors aren't leading every part of the worship service.

The congregation also enjoys a mix of intergenerational fellowship opportunities ones geared to specific age groups and demographics. For education, survey respondents prefer both classroom lecture style opportunities and small group discussion classes. The congregation sees the value of hands-on missions and wants to do more hands-on mission while also continuing our commitment to give to local mission projects.

Thank you to everyone who filled out a survey. It helps the leadership of the church better understand who we are as a church, and who we want to be.

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What Shall We Plan for?

Planning. Advanced planning pays dividends. So we plan our evening meals, we plan our home improvement projects, we plan special occasion gatherings for Thanksgiving, Christmas, Easter, birthdays and anniversaries. We plan our vacations. We plan our work days and our weekends. We plan for our children's education and a wide array of extra-curricular activities for them. And if we are fortunate, we plan how to spend our tax refund. Planning pays dividends.

It also is beneficial to plan for emergencies: Like a savings account for when the wash machine or the refrigerator breaks down or the car needs repair. And, ever since the tornado in Washington, many of us have a severe weather plan. Life comes with some unexpecteds, and it is good to anticipate some of them, and to make plans.

There are certain things we can count on, some pleasant to think about others not so much. Very few of us spend much time thinking about our own mortality because it is not pleasant to do so. But then that diagnosis comes, or the body wears down, or we see friends and family of our age group dying, and we begin to face the inevitable that every one of us shall encounter death at some time. There is no escape plan. One of the things that faith does for us, is give us reassurance. God knew that we would need assurance, so God put an assurance plan into place. We call it the gospel message of Jesus that we have celebrated Easter Sunday. Assurance that nothing, even death can separate us from the love of God because of the promise of resurrection. Both in our living and in our dying, we belong to God.

God took advanced planning seriously. And we should, too. There are things that we can be doing, planning that can be done which gives reassurance and comfort to our families when time comes to make decisions about healthcare, dying with dignity (end of life choices), disposition of our material possessions, funeral planning (including whether or not to cremate), funeral service planning, and what to do/where to put our bodies and our cremains. Advanced planning is a gift that you can give to yourself and your family.

We want to come alongside you to help with your planning, so during the month of April we are offering "Mapping Your Exit" as our Connecting Point class. We have invited some experts to lead us and guide us in our planning. See details in the Connecting Point section, page 8 of the Chimes. We invite you to come and learn what you can plan for and begin putting into writing your wishes. And we ask that you consider sharing your funeral plan with one of the pastors so we can better assist your family when that day comes.

It is our hope and prayer that you will choose advanced planning as a means of reassurance and comfort for yourself and your family for when that inevitable day arrives.

Uniting in Vision-Worship

On Sunday, March 13th we had a Uniting in Vision event at UPC. I was encouraged by the insight, excitement, and thoughtfulness of the dialogue provided by all who were in attendance. As I was leaving for home that evening, I was asking myself, "what are my hopes and dreams in the next 5 or 10 years for the worship ministry here at UPC?"

One of the qualities of UPC that attracted me most when I accepted the position in August of 2014 was the commitment to worshiping together as a generationally and theologically diverse community. As an inclusive church, I was overjoyed to see people celebrating their uniqueness and unity as opposed to divisively separating themselves into pockets of people who looked, acted, and believed identically to themselves. To this day, the dedication to faithfully worship in diverse ways as a unified body of believers is still the most attractive quality about UPC for me.

In 5 or 10 years, it would be my hope and dream that UPC would be a leader in intergenerational worship and a leader in the blended form of worship.

To be honest, I don't care if we have the best choir, worship band, bell choir, or celtic group in the city. I don't care if we have the largest attended Christmas concerts in the city. And I don't care if our services are publicized and streamed by the consumers on television or the internet.

I care about a diverse and passionate community worshiping God in unique, creative, and powerful ways as a unified body of Christfollowers.

It is my hope and dream that the Sunday worship binds us together in unified song and prayer that informs, inspires, and connects us with the Gospel message we proclaim unceasingly. It is my dream that the young, old, middle-aged, single, widow, married, outcast, minority, majority, progressive, conservative, gay, straight, Republican, Democrat, black, brown, and white can all find participation and leadership in our worship.

Put simply, what gets me excited about the ministry I lead is when people find their voice in worship.

It's when I hear the congregation sing a beloved song with boisterous confidence and conviction. Or when the children of the church have leadership in worship and inform others while being nurtured as a child of God and this community in the process. Or when we have a hymn on organ, a contemporary song with the band, and a song with the choir and bell choir that mutually connect with one another but also offers a different sound of praise to God connecting with a diverse body of believers. Or when we take hymn lyrics hundreds of years old and sing them in relevant and meaningful way in our current context.

No matter what direction we head as a church following the call of the Holy Spirit, may we always worship in such a way where each voice matters and where each voice can find their participation in our communal worship of God.

Memorial Garden Special Price Reduction

For centuries, Christians have honored their loved ones with dignified final resting places in churchyards on their grounds. In this tradition, United Presbyterian Church's Memorial Garden provides a place of repose and remembrance in a lovely sacred garden where one can peacefully meditate upon the lives of those who have died.

Located just outside the building on the north side of the grounds, the Memorial Garden is an integral part of UPC's ministry at the end of life. It provides a beautiful, meaningful place where members and their families can proceed directly from a memorial service to inter a loved one near their church home. In celebration of God's everlasting promise, the Memorial Garden provides spiritual comfort and a permanent place to contemplate life eternal. The Garden is an integral part of our United Presbyterian Church community. The Garden has become of place of beauty, areas for quiet reflection, and a sacred place where loved ones are memorialized.

Currently, each plot in the Memorial Garden costs \$1800. The price is all-inclusive, which means there are no other fees at the time of burial. The Memorial Garden Committee is offering a special reduced price of \$1600 for three months beginning April 1st. This is a great opportunity to make end of life arrangements for yourself or loved ones. Health and Wellness

A Salty Subject

Sea salt has boomed in popularity in restaurants and supermarket aisles. Many gourmet chefs say they prefer it over table salt for its coarse, crunchy texture and stronger flavor. Manufacturers are using it in potato chips and other snacks because it is "all natural" and less processed than table salt. Some health conscious consumers choose it because it contains minerals like magnesium. Each of these characteristics may set it apart from normal table salt but in one very important area sea salt and table salt are equal: the sodium content.

Many people falsely believe that sea salt is better for you because it has a lower sodium content than regular table salt. Both table salt and most sea salts contain about 40 percent sodium by weight. Here is the keymost sea salts have a larger crystal than table salt, so they may have less sodium by volume (e.g. by teaspoon or tablespoon). A teaspoon of table salt has about 2,300 mg of sodium but a teaspoon of sea salt may contain less sodium, simply because fewer crystals fit into the spoon.

As far as production, sea salt is obtained directly through the evaporation of seawater. It is usually not processed or undergoes only minimal processing. This allows sea salt to retain trace levels of minerals like magnesium, potassium, calcium and other nutrients. Table salt on the other hand, is mined from salt deposits and is processed to give it a fine texture that is easier to use in recipes. Processing strips table salt of any minerals it may have contained and has additives used to help prevent clumping or caking.

Which is better for you? The experts suggest it simply comes down to a taste preference. While the addition of trace minerals and nutrients attracts many, the amounts obtained from eating sea salt are very small and easily obtained through the consumption of a healthy diet. As for sea salt being a lower sodium option- well, that simply isn't the case. Because of the larger crystal size, sea salt may actually be causing people to consume more sodium than with table salt, further increasing their risk of high blood pressure and heart disease. I challenge each of you to think about your sodium intake. Go to www.sodiumbreakup.heart.org/ pledge and take the pledge to reduce your sodium intake today. Read food labels carefully and take the salt shaker off the table and put it back in the cupboard! Your heart will thank you!

Meeting Will Bring Together Local Civic, Business, and Religious Leaders to Answer Community's Questions About Islam



Church Treasurer Money Talk

We all know that contributions to United Presbyterian Church pay for the operations and ministries of the church. Here is a quick review for the year and through February. For the year our pledge budget is \$510,000 and the unpledged budget is \$40,000. Through February the actual figures are \$78,646 for pledges which is 15.42% and for unpledged it is \$8,854 which is 22.14%. February is two months of the twelve month budget which is 16.67% so our pledged income is a little under budget and the unpledged income is over budget.

Compared to last year the pledge budget was \$530,000 and the unpledged budget was \$40,000. The actual results were \$620,616 for pledges and \$71,241.00 for unpledged. Both categories exceed budget by a good amount.

Several comments are in order. The increase for the pledged budget was due to a nice bequest in excess of \$50,000 and matching funds from Foundation contributions to pay off the mortgage which we refer to as MAP. Last year we paid off \$133,394 in mortgage debt and as of the end of February, 2016 we now owe \$790,782.

The pledged income is down this year from last year so there is a concern that we will not have the positive results as we did last year. We are holding the \$50,000 plus bequest in a special account with the hope that we can use it to pay more on the mortgage, but if not we may need those funds for the operating expenses.

As you continue the honor pledges and make gifts to the church, please remember two thoughts: 1) any additional contributions UPC would be a blessing and help to achieve good financial results; and 2) as you do estate planning, please remember United Presbyterian Church in your planning and your will. This recent bequest is a gift from a deceased member and will benefit UPC and our ministries in the future.

One last note; in order to be cost effective, quarterly statements will no longer be sent out. If you need one, feel free to contact the office and they will be glad to print one out.

Online Giving with Realm

A great, new addition to UPC this year is Realm. For those that haven't had a chance to sign up and look around, Realm is an online community that gives us another avenue to connect with each other and with our giving. I have been anxiously waiting for Realm to get set up for months because, for the first time, our congregation has the option to set up and track giving online. For those who prefer operating online or via mobile phone, Realm is everything you could ask for and more in an online tithing option.

The site and payment processing are done via a secure connection, which provides great peace of mind to anyone who may be weary of online giving. Whether you're updating your profile or submitting your one time gift for per capita, Realm operates on an encrypted connection that protects all of your personal information.

Realm is easily accessed via computer, mobile phone, or tablet. The system is user friendly and very easy to navigate. There's no guess work involved throughout the process and instructions are clear. In my online giving experiences so far, I've submitted tithes in less than 3 minutes.

Tithe with flexibility. You can choose to have your tithe submitted from a checking or savings account, your debit card, or your favorite rewards credit card. Additionally, you determine the frequency of your tithe. Set up one time payments or recurring payments on a frequency of your choice (weekly, biweekly, bi- monthly, and monthly). The flexibility to tithe on your schedule and with your preferred method adds a new element to tithing that we haven't had available to us before.

Last, but not least, you no longer have to guess if you're on track with your pledging or if you've contributed to per capita yet this year. A progress bar shows you how much you've given in comparison to your pledge for the year. A ledger of your pledged giving and special contributions is available for viewing and helpful for tracking purposes. I think it's very cool that we see a visual representation of our giving throughout the year.

If you haven't had a chance to check out Realm, pop by the site, onrealm.org, when you get a few minutes and take a look around. A new way to give is just one of the many options now available to us through this fantastic online system. You can also go straight to online giving by going to the UPC website under "Giving."
