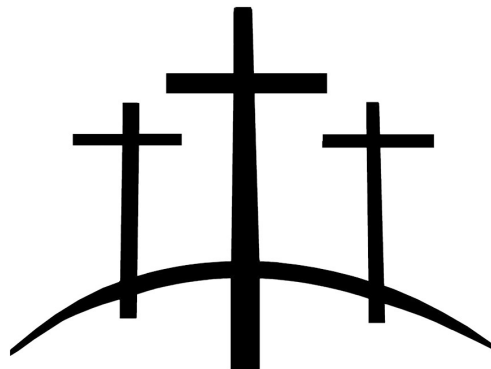

Why The Cross?

We are rapidly approaching holy week, and looming over the drama of Palm Sunday is the shadow of a cross and the critical issue of why, in the name of God, would Jesus do what he did. Why would God, who we believe is present, incarnate, in the life of Jesus, why would God become so involved in such a messy, political, potentially violent event, an event of human pain and suffering and death? Why the cross?

We are Easter people, we Christians are, but we live in a Good Friday world. Many have said that. We know what it means. Easter is coming, but not until Good Friday. Innocent people suffer, suicide bombers kill civilians, precious young soldiers die, babies come with heart defects, tests come back positive, relationships sour and die, children are sold into sex slavery—it's a Good Friday world.

Do we have to talk about the cross? Can't we just focus on the positive, uplifting parts of the story, the love and grace of God, the mercy and forgiveness, the acceptance and pardon? We'd like to; we try, frankly. But, Fred Craddock writes,

Sooner or later somebody is going to say to you, "Then what happened to Jesus?" And when you tell them the truth, that he came to the city as a 33-year-old young idealist and stirred the city and the city turned on him and just like that put him on trial and executed him, some people are going to back away. Can't we just leave that part out? Focus on the positive? People aren't interested in a man who dies like that. It's a terrible growth strategy for the church, all that, morbid suffering and bleeding and dying.

Craddock describes a big California megachurch that told the architect for their new building, "We do not want any crosses, either outside or inside. None. We don't want anybody to think weakness or failure!"

Jesus "emptied himself," St. Paul wrote. He "took the form of a slave, became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross." In Jesus Christ, God, that is to say—remarkably—God emptied God's self for us, to come as close as it is possible to come to us.

Fred Craddock, who is not only simply one of the best preachers but also scholar and teacher of preaching, writes with an elegant simplicity. He describes that most-common human occurrence: a child falls down and skins a knee or elbow and comes running to mother.

The mother picks up the child and says—in the oldest myth in the world—"Let me kiss it and make it well." . . . She picks up the child, kisses the skinned place, holds the child in her lap, and all is well. Did her kiss make it well? No. It was that ten minutes in her lap. Just sit in the lap of love and see the mother crying. "Mother, why are you crying? I'm the one who hurt my elbow." "Because you hurt," the mother says, "I hurt." That does more for the child than all the bandages and medicine in the world, just sitting in her lap."

Pastor's Message Continued

"What is the cross?" Craddock asks. "Can I say it this way? It is to sit for a few minutes in the lap of God, who hurts because you hurt" (Cherry Log Sermons: Why the Cross?).

Something profoundly true is happening on Palm Sunday as our Lord enters the city and with great courage and a holy intentionality lives out the last days of his life as one of us, betrayed and denied by friends, unjustly tried, suffered, died. Something tragic, but way beyond tragedy, something terrible and awesome and beautiful beyond description is happening. Something the truth of which we know in our hearts—something about love becoming vulnerable, love exposing itself to heartbreak, something about the voluntary long-suffering of any love worth the name, something C. S. Lewis meant when he said, "To love at all is to be vulnerable. Love anything and your heart will certainly be wrong and possibly broken. If you want to make sure of keeping it intact you must give your heart to no one" (The Four Loves, p. 111).

We are approaching Holy Week: Palm Sunday, Holy Week, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday—this holiest of weeks in which Jesus suffers and dies—is God giving God's own heart to the world, to you and me and every one of us.

And so whatever else you do that week, which on the surface is no different than any other week, find a way to pause and ponder and stand a while beneath the cross of Jesus and, with the faithful of all the ages, to see

Eastertide Sermon Series- Life Together: Christ in our Relationships

Paying attention to this fundamental truth of Christian faith is what gives our faith energy and hope. Why Do We Do That?

Worship at United Presbyterian Church is always changing because people, time, and circumstances are always changing. We have a foundational liturgical structure that remains intact, but specific components of the liturgy are always in flux. As leaders of the church, we try to balance creative change with upholding tradition and any changes we make are done so carefully and thoughtfully as to protect this delicate balance.

Over the past (almost) three years since I have been at UPC, we have made some changes to Sunday worship and I have tried to communicate through conversation and articles why these changes have been made. To set up a platform for future communication, I want to have the title of this article be a re-occurring one that unpacks a rationale for any given change in the Sunday worship gathering. For this month, I would like to focus on why we started doing the song of illumination.

As liturgists and worship planners, we like to talk about the “arch” or “trajectory” of a service. Every liturgy has a shape in terms of how it flows. The energy increases and decreases and things happen of smaller importance and greater importance. There are two important heightened moments of the liturgy; the receiving of the Word and the receiving of the Sacrament of Communion. Both of these liturgical acts function as a “means of grace.” In other words, God is present in a unique way during these two events. The service of the Word and the service of the Table are two pillars of the Christian experience.

During communion the pastor says a lot of words before the gathered take the Elements. There is a prayer of thanksgiving, a prayer of consecration, and the words of institution. During the prayer of consecration the pastor asks the Holy Spirit to be fully present in the elements of communion. This both acknowledges that God shows up in a special way during communion and communicates the need for the gathered to depend on the Holy Spirit’s guidance for proper participation in the Meal.

The prayer/song of Illumination is to the Word what the prayer of consecration is to the Table. The prayer/song of illumination asks the Holy Spirit to be with those gathered in a special way in order for them to properly hear and absorb the Word of God proclaimed and preached. This prayer/song also elevates the importance of God’s Word in the liturgy. It effectively communicates how important God’s word is to the nourishment of God’s people.

This is one of the main reasons why we have started adding in the song of illumination. If you have any questions about this addition or any feedback, please do not hesitate to ask me.

Have you ever wished that someone would just listen to you?

That is exactly what Stephen Ministers do. The men and women who are Stephen Ministers will listen, give you their undivided attention, won't judge you, will keep everything you say in confidence and will pray with you. They are people from our congregation who are trained and organized to help provide Christian care-giving to members of our congregation.

Here are some comments from people who have received the caring ministry of a Stephen Minister.

- I'm so glad I accepted my pastor's offer to match me with a Stephen Minister.
- I was reluctant at first, but my pastor was right; having someone I could regularly meet with and talk to really did make a difference.

I was able to tell my Stephen Minister things I could never have told a friend. She never judged me or looked down on me. She just listened and cared. It was just what I needed.

Seven Stephen Ministers received 50 hours of training here at United Presbyterian Church in 2013. These men and women multiplied the amount of caring ministry that United Presbyterian Church could provide. Because of changes in life situations, four of our Stephen Ministers have become inactive which leaves only two women and one man to carry on this ministry.

We are excited that Stan Strickler will be attending the one-week Stephen Series Leader's Training Course in St. Louis in April. When he returns, we will be offering a class for new Stephen Ministers. Sunday Education Hour at 9:00am

Strange Book of Books Class (Library Room 106)

Due to the success and interest in the Strange Book of Books series that the Thursday Morning Bible Study is doing, Pastor Stephen is offering the class on Sunday mornings.

As opposed to many studies, which focus on particular books of the Bible, or on a specific theme, this 10 part series steps back to ask questions about the way we read scripture. Many Christians are accustomed to reading scripture in a devotional mode, looking for a personal message they find spiritually uplifting. While this can be valuable, it has the potential drawback of making the Bible overly familiar, domesticating its diverse and complicated content into something immediately applicable to each individual life. This series will reveal things about the Bible you may never have heard before and help you see the Bible with fresh eyes and fresh faith.

Journey Through the Bible (Heritage Room 107)

This Bible Study group, led by Don Baker, is dedicated to growing in knowledge of God through what is revealed in the Bible. We interpret the stories for their relevance then, and seek to understand their relevance for today. Each participant receives a workbook. Bring your Bible, or use one of ours. The class is currently studying the Books of Jeremiah and Lamentations.

Followers Book Discussion (Sewing Room 105)

The class is continuing to read and discuss *Half Truths: God Helps Those Who Help Themselves and Other Things The Bible Doesn't Say* by Adam Hamilton. They are simple phrases. They sound Christian—like something you might find in the Bible. We've all heard these words. Maybe we've said them. They capture some element of truth, yet they miss the point in important ways.

Join the group in searching for the whole truth by comparing common Christian clichés to the message and ministry of Jesus. The clichés include:
 Everything happens for a reason.
 God helps those who help themselves.
 God won't give you more than you can handle.
 God said it, I believe it, that settles it.
 Love the sinner, hate the sin.

Connecting Point

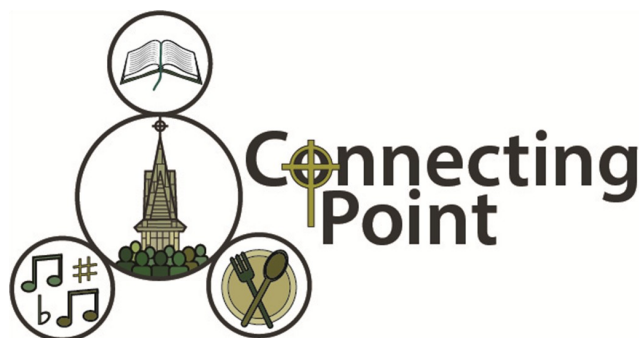

Needs at Northmoor Elementary

Pastor Stephen recently met with the Principal at Northmoor Elementary to discover any pressing needs of the school and students, and ways that UPC could help. We currently provide Snack Packs to 40 students a week there, and they are grateful, but they do have some pressing needs.

They need volunteers who will commit to coming once a week to read with students (mostly second graders). These students not only need help with their reading and practice reading out loud to gain confidence, they also need positive and consistent adult mentors in their lives.

The school also needs outdoor play equipment like outdoor basketballs, footballs, soccer balls, hula hoops, etc. With recent budget cuts at the state level, the school can't provide these desired items. But even more importantly, the Principal shared a desire to have volunteers come and play with the kids at recess. Many of the children have never really learned how to play. They don't know about taking turns, sharing, or the rules of many games. They would love someone to come once a week or once a month to play with the kids and lead them in some games.

These are just two ways you can make a big difference to students in our community. If you are interested in being a reading buddy or a recess buddy, please let Pastor Stephen know. We'll also be collecting outdoor play equipment all month long. You can bring your donations to the Food Pantry closet by the bathrooms in the Fellowship Hall.

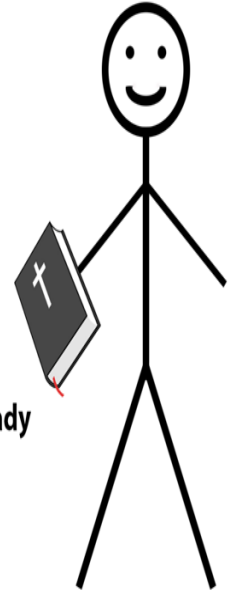

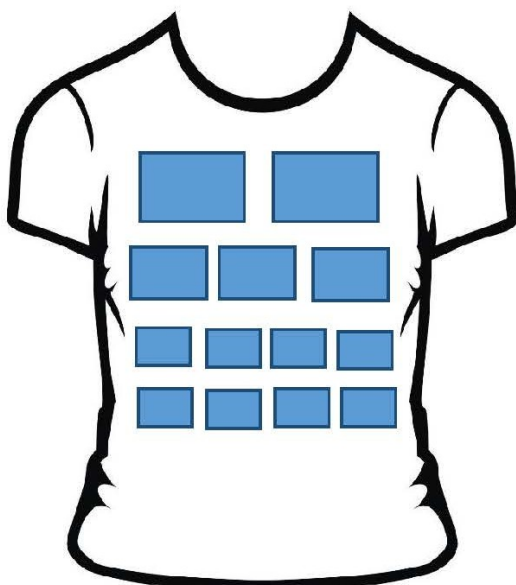
